

Pete Greig, co-founder of the global 24-7 prayer movement, is a gifted communicator who writes with insight and honesty about what can be a taboo for some Christians. He wrestles with the long-term life threatening illness of his wife, and the stories of many others, to provide wisdom and hope in



hard times. Difficult questions about our faith are addressed in the context of the Bible and the Easter story in particular, together with examples from his own experience as a pastor and friend to many.

There is a 40 day devotional journey to explore Scripture and the issues raised in the 14 chapters structured around three key questions: How am I going to get through this? Why aren't my prayers being answered? Where is God when heaven is silent?

There are glowing reviews from some prominent Christian leaders and the book has helped me to see more of God's perspective on my own long-term health issues and the struggles of others. 

#### Street Pastors Prayermail

Families all over Preston are under so much pressure at the moment.



Home-schooling, home working, Stay at Home, it is a tough life if you are in a residential block of flats with no outdoor space to let off steam. Maybe a one or two bedroom place with everyone competing for a laptop. We will have seen stories on the news about wifi poverty. Kids sitting outside McDonalds just to get online free.

#### Can we pray for families this week?

- For those under pressure through working at home
- Children struggling with school work and missing friends
- Tensions rising and tempers fraying
- Those unable to get a breath of fresh air
- Missing parents or older children that are a long way away
- Those job hunting to provide for the family



### What does Mission look like?

Crosslinks asked some of their mission partners what mission looks like for them:

Jirka and Keira are working in the Czech Republic. 'In general, Czechs don't know what Christianity is and they don't have preconceptions about Christians or churches. As there is little Christian presence in the Czech Republic – few believers and few churches - we focus on grassroots evangelism. We start by sharing the gospel in the street by speaking to people and giving out flyers and tracts. We are then able to invite anyone who is interested to events we are running. Another key part of

frontline evangelism is grounding Christians in the faith. We lead new believers through an introduction to the Bible and they hear the Bible preached on Sundays in church.'

Theo (age 13) says, 'I live in Spain with my mum, dad and sister. I see us as missionaries together so I feel that we are a team. When we left the UK, it was difficult leaving friends behind and moving to a country where you can't understand people. However, I am now able to communicate better with people around me, which

means I don't feel like such an outsider.'



Sofia (age 16) says, 'We moved to Italy in 2013 and the first three years were hard. I found it hard not to constantly pine for England. Now, seven years later, we are more bonded as a family, we have Christian friends in Naples and feel very much settled. One of the things God has taught me is that my home is in heaven and I will never feel completely at home in Naples or in England.'

day includes: 'Near back-to-back Zoom calls or virtual meetings and innumerable WhatsApp chats! The pandemic has

actually assisted our member care is that it has sped-up the roll-out of our kids programme. We now run monthly Zoom calls for the children of our mission partners, to connect them with one another for encouragement and support. As a spin-off of this, a group of mums have formed a WhatsApp group to share learning and encourage one another in their ministry

Neil leads a local Church in Derby in a multi-cultural, inner-city suburb. Neil's church plays a part in global mission without stepping outside Derby. They do this by praying for mission, giving financially, and keeping in touch with the mission partners they support.
