The cost will be 50p per family, and you will need to bring refreshments for yourself and your child, as we are not yet able to provide food or drink.



News from Craig and Elaine Watson, who took our World Focus Sunday a weeks back:

The end is in sight. Indeed, we are busily planning for the start of the new academic year already. Timetables are being written, classes are being handed over and recruitment is well underway. This year we have developed our recruitment process to better reflect our stated mission: "To provide excellent education, primarily for the Christian mission community and Nepali

school communities, based on biblical values. Through KISC's international K-12 school and EQUIP teacher training programme, students and staff will positively impact their world." As a result of this new approach we have had a very high level of applications for the posts we have on offer. In the first week alone, we received over 200

applications from qualified teachers from around the world. We are still working our way through all the posts, and despite the disruption that the current second wave of Covid is causing in Nepal, we are still steadily recruiting staff.

We are particularly looking forward to introducing into the Secondary School, French and German courses to go alongside Spanish in our languages provision. The provision of teachers to teach these languages opens up the opportunity for IGCSEs and AS - A Levels in all three of these subjects, in addition to the continuing internally assessed provision of Korean and Nepali.

We continue to give thanks for the support that the HDCS hospitals are receiving from around the world and we pray that they may be places of hope and comfort, even in the darkest of moments, to the communities they serve. It has been heart-warming to see how students and staff in KISC; Primary, Secondary and EQUIP, have sought to provide

support through encouragement and action to help out at this time. At this time, those who are in Nepal are applying the proverb: "It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness" as they seek to be the light of the world, following in the footsteps of Christ.

Craig says: "in Nepal, the lockdown has become even stricter, with virtual house arrest apart from fresh fruit and veg, and milk, purchases in a defined two hour window during the day. This very severe lockdown, being enforced with arrests and large fines, is an attempt to stem the spread of Covid which is taking a heavy toll. Please pray for KISC's international staff who are now faced with the likelihood that they will not be able to return to their home countries for the summer break, and are facing an uncertain future isolated from each other until the current restrictions are lifted. Also pray for the Nepali staff who are seeing people die of Covid in their communities, churches and in some cases their own families."

Walking into church is a much more complicated and important subject than it first appears. There are countless different ways to walk into church - walking in with different attitudes or expectations or obligations. How do you walk into church?

The answer to that not-so-simple question will largely be determined by what you think church is, and what you think you're doing there. That's what this little book is all about.
